




Figure 2 (above). Illustrated by Eloise Burns, date unknown.


Figure 3 (left). Illustrated by Brian Wild Smith in 1966.






















1st Row, left: unknown; center: Eloise Wilkin, 1978; right: Fern Bisel Peat, 1940.
