I enjoyed listening to the Wurlitzer 153 band organ on their Dentzel carousel. They played my favorite band organ roll (13166), the march roll for the 150 scale. In summer 2006, I was excited knowing I would hear the organ again, but was heartbroken when I saw the organ had been turned off. Unfortunately, in 2007 the organ was removed. I still hope someday Kings Island will restore their organ, and I will hear that beautiful music again.

When I was 11, I discovered something wonderful after watching a video—that band organ rallies exist! I couldn't wait to go to my first rally! In June, I went to my first rally in Gallipolis, Ohio. I was excited when we pulled up in our car and heard all that beautiful music. It was a blast and everyone was so nice! I saw some organs that I didn't even know existed. I also met Larry Kern who gave me two CDs and a pin of his organ. In August, I went to the

When summer began, I couldn't wait to go to all the band organ rallies. I went to Lake Winnie and had the time of my life! I met Ron and Glynn Keisler and the Southern Rose, a gorgeous Ruth model 33A, but I can't forget *Rosebud*! I also met Pauline Leonard and John Ashworth. They were extremely nice and taught me how to change the rolls and operate the great North Tonawanda Military band organ. I really liked the crank organ and *Trudy* concert. Even though it rained most of the time, I didn't mind.
