I was fortunate to get involved in the hobby early enough to meet Arthur Bursens, and get to know Carl Frei Jr., George Cushing, Tom Varley, Arthur Mason and others in Europe

well-known for their involvement in the organ world. All these people, now deceased, were generous with their time and very kind in the early years.

JoAnn and I enjoy attending rallies and visiting collections and venues featuring organs and other instruments.
