As far back as I can remember, I have been interested in carnivals and circuses. Normally, we would have one or two cir-

cuses come during the summers in my hometown of Chillicothe; and the Gooding Amusement Company of Columbus, Ohio would bring the excitement and sounds of the carnival about three times a year.

I was always drawn to the "sound of the merry-go-round." I didn't know what made that sound, but I liked it and knew what it meant...fun! None of that has changed!

I have been mechanically inclined all my life. When the neighborhood kids were playing ball, I was making something with my erector set, working on a bicycle, building a model airplane, or playing carnival! It was not unusual for me to have a "Pitch 'Til You Win" game set up in my backyard complete with microphone and loud speaker, especially if a carnival had recently been in town.

I returned from the Navy in 1966, and bounced around from one mechanical hobby to another. In 1968 I bought a player piano and set out to make it play. I soon learned of Harvey Roehl's Vestal Press, Larry Given's book *Rebuilding*

It wasn't very long until I had made an "O" roll-playing "Built-up" orchestrion from another homestyle player piano. Also, during these early years of my introduction to mechanical music, I finally learned what made the "sound of the merrygo-round," and I haven't looked back since! hopes of learning more and feeding my band organ interests, I joined MBSI and FOPS in 1968.

In the early 1970's I had the good fortune of becoming acquainted with Ken Smith, Jerry Betts and Don Stinson. Band organs, specifically Wurlitzer, became much of my life, and they still are.

In 1973, while working in the Display Department at Sears, I met a 19 year old "preacher's kid" by the name of Debbie Allison. Debbie and I were married in 1975, and the best years of our lives began. That's now been over 32 years, and band organs have always been, and still are, a major part of our lives.

As for Debbie, we spent part of our honeymoon at Ohio's amusement park, Cedar Point. At that time, it proudly exhibited four Wurlitzer organs. That was Debbie's first experience with band organs. She was elated, to say the least. From that time until the present, she has shared this fascination of band organs, and the love of their beautiful sound with me.

We, who are band organ enthusiasts, have the opportunity, and probably the responsibility, to keep that joy alive for the future. We are the keepers of this piece of Americana, this part of our history that seems to be so rapidly disappearing! We, like so many of you have done for some time, are truly looking forward to being able to share our organ and its beautiful sound with all who will listen!
