Because of the Myrtle Beach Ruth, we decided to purchase a small Ruth organ, if possible. It took over two years to find it, then we finally located a Ruth Model 33 that was for sale in Chicago. It sounded awful, but at least it played, and we were ready for a challenge! The organ was rebuilt over the next two years, with a lot of advice from our good organ friends, especially the late Ken Smith and Mike Kitner.

From the beginning, our primary objective was to share our organ and her happy music with the general public. So, it was

put on a trailer and taken to festivals and special events. Since that time, we've played our *Southern Rose* band organ at hundreds of special events, and it has been a privilege for us to be able to share her music with many thousands of people all across the Southeast.

Both of us have enjoyed being members of the COAA, and the many friends that we've made since joining the organization. I am currently pleased to serve as Vice-President of the COAA and in recent

years, Glynn and I have worked to organize the COAA Organ Rallies at Lake Winnepesaukah.

In addition to Band Organs, there are other musical interests that we enjoy. We both play instruments in local community bands and orchestras. Glynn plays the oboe and I play percussion. Most recently, Glynn has organized a small twelvepiece Salon Orchestra that dresses in vintage style clothing and plays popular light music from the 1880s through the 1920s. This orchestra is named The New Century Salon Orchestra and she and I play many of the same songs that are Band Organ favorites, including *By the Light of the Silvery Moon, Alexander's Ragtime Band, Teddy Bear's Picnic*, and *The Old Timers Waltz Medley*.
